### **Course Description**

This course serves as an introduction to electronic literature. We will engage both theories of new media and the burgeoning canon of electronic texts. Alongside our study of canonical texts, we will examine a range of digital texts towards a further understanding of how electronic literature influences a broad spectrum of media. We will explore the constraints as well as conditions of possibility that attend writing in electronic media. Students will be expected to engage in critical close readings of electronic works as well as create their own piece of electronic literature.

### **Course Goals**

This course has two main goals. The first is to familiarize students with the emerging field of electronic literature. This familiarization is geared towards both an understanding of the academic canon as well as more diffuse and popular methods of engagement. Towards this end students should begin to recognize themselves as situated within a transitional period rife with various blended media. The second is to nudge students towards an understanding of the multiple ways that electronic literature can be engaged. We will look towards creating our own pieces of electronic literature as a means of engaging these works on their own terms. The various technical skills necessary for this engagement will be introduced, but it will be up to students to develop them more fully.

### **Assignments**

Course Blog—Updated twice weekly (One post directly concerning a piece of E Lit and one concerning a class reading). The blog should act as an experimental space to reflect on readings and explore theory.

Group Presentations—The class will be split into four groups. Each group will present twice on the intersections of electronic literature and new media theory. Specific details forthcoming.

6-8 Page Paper—A sustained engagement with course issues. Specific topic questions forthcoming.

Website—Each student will be required to build his or her own website (either on personal or UF provided space). This will act as a foundation for the final project.

Final Project—Using the concepts and models that we have examined throughout the semester students will theorize and create a piece of electronic literature that examines an issue raised in this course.

### **Grading Criteria:**

Grades will be based on individual project criteria to be outlined in further detail on individual assignment sheets. The Participation and Blogging grades will be based on completion.
